TO ALL PEOPLE TO WHOME THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME _____ I, HARDY STRICKLAND, do Sende Greeting. Know ye that the said HARDY STRICKLAND of the county of Madison and the state of Georgia for and in consideration of the love and good will and affection which I have and do bear towards my loving son HARDY STRICKLAND of the county of Madison and state of Georgia. Have given and granted unto the said HARDY STRICKLAND, his heirs, executors, administrators or assigns all that tract of land containing 100 acres more or less lying parte in Franklin County and parte in Madison County and state of Georgia. Beginning on JOHN FREEMAN'S line on the Big Branch from thence Down the Big Branch to the Creek from thence to the Back line a strait Coarse.

Also my wife, SUSANA STRICKLAND, is to live on the said CHARLES STRICKLAND land that I give to him During her Natural life or widowhood and to have the priviledge of said house and to be maintained upon the profit of said land.

The following obituary was printed in a Starke, FL., newspaper on Feb. 7, 1980. It was submitted by Mrs. S. F. Matthews.

JOHN NEWTON STRICKLAND, 161, died Monday, Feb. 4, following an extended illness. Born and raised in Bradford Co., and the son of the late JASPER & MAGGIE GILLARD STRICKLAND, pioneer residents of Bradford Co., MR. STRICKLAND was self-employed. He was also a member of the First Christian Church of Starke.

Survivors are his wife, MRS. RUBY MAE STRICKLAND, Starke; 1 daughter, MRS. JEWEL CASEY, Hampton Lake; 2 sons, JACK STRICKLAND, Jacksonville, and ARTHUR STRICKLAND, Starke; 16 grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 9, at the Chapel of Archer-Tanner Funeral Home, with Rev. M. E. Drake, pastor of the Church of God, officiating. Burial will be in Santa Fe Cemetery with Archer-Tanner Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

STRICKLAND BRIDES OF NASH COUNTY IN NEXT ISSUE

THUMBNAIL SKETCH OF A FAMOUS STRICKLAND

WILLIAM STRICKLAND, an architect, was born about 1787 in Philadelphia, PA, the son of John Strickland. Among the buildings he designed during his lifetime were the Masonic Temple (first major building in Philadelphia, 1810); the first U. S. Custom House (Philadelphia, 1819); and the Bank of the United States (1824). He died April 6, 1854, and is buried beneath the Tennessee Capitol in Nashville, Tennessee.

DIGGING FOR ROOTS
A HAIR-RAISING EXPERIENCE

One of our members has discovered genealogy can be a dangerous game. R. G. Pyle, a retired meteorologist living in Shreveport, LA., had just begun the quest for his ancestors when his search led him in the path of a killer tornado. The following story of his hair-raising experience was published in "The Shreveport Times" on April 15, 1979.

"Sometimes looking for your roots can be a real hair-raising experience. Just ask R. G. Pyle.

In the North Texas town of Petrolia Tuesday, looking for the burial site of his ancestors, Pyle was one of thousands left stunned by the savage tornado which devastated nearby Wichita Falls. But the Shreveport resident is thankful he's not one of the 58 left dead.

Leaning against his damaged Ford stationwagon - now parked at his Clingman Drive home - Pyle recounts how the killer twister, found him just east of Wichita Falls.

Headed west toward Wichita Falls to find a vacant motel, Pyle said he heard reports of the oncoming storm, but the retired weather forecaster could never have predicted what happened next.

Stopping at a service station then a church to watch the storm approach Wichita Falls, Pyle decided that if he headed south he would be able to circumvent the twister.

'When I heard it was coming across town, I figured it would go northeast, toward the church and the little gas station where I had stopped. So I turned and headed south, trying to go around it. But I didn't make it.'

The storm cut him off just down the road.

Calling attention to his battered car and bruised right leg, Pyle tells how he viewed the approaching storm: 'I didn't really see it. I was hit with a wall of water, small hail then larger hail, then I knew I was in it. I stopped the car in its tracks covered my face and prayed for the best.'

His prayers were answered.

Bricks and lumber brought by the storm from Wichita Falls, severely damaged the front of Pyle's car and shattered the windshield. Pieces of 4 by 4 crashed through both passenger windows and Pyle was pelted with small debris. His glasses were broken and his car was violently shaken by high winds. But he survived.

'By the time I reached for my suitcase to cover my face, it was over,' Pyle recalls. 'That's when I realized that I had my foot pressing against the brake peddle, although the ignition was turned off.'

When the storm passed, Pyle saw houses to the front and rear severely damaged by the twister. The roof was taken from a residence only a few yards from where he sat huddled in his car.

Backtracking his pre-storm route, Pyle said if he had stayed at the church or the service station he would have been spared the ordeal. 'That section was untouched,' he said. 'But I can't complain too much. I lived through it.'

Passing neighbors now stop regularly to hear Pyle's survival tale and view the damaged car. As they do they can't help but notice a bumper sticker on rear of the vehicle: "I found it." And if they didn't know what the slogan meant before, they and their shaken neighbor certainly do now."

GEORGIA'S COUNTIES

Georgia has more counties per population than any other state in the union. If the size of a state were determined by the number of counties within its boundaries, Georgia would be considered the second largest state (159 counties). Texas, of course, is the largest (254 counties).

Georgia's first eight counties were located along the Atlantic coastline and the South Carolina border. These counties were Burke, Camden, Chatham, Effingham, Glynn, Liberty, Richmond and Wilkes. They were created in 1777 by the first constitution of the new state of Georgia. Some of this area had already been settled for many years by early colonists, but the creation of state and county governments drew settlers from the bordering states of North Carolina and South Carolina.

The early Georgia counties were too large to enable the residents to easily reach the county seat. Travel was difficult due to bad roads and poor transportation. Gradually the larger counties were divided to make county seats more accessible. Sections were cut off and added to new counties as land was ceded by the Creek and Cherokee Indians. Occasionally, counties were divided due to incompatibility of one section with another section of a county. By the time of the War Between the States, the number of counties had multiplied to 132.

Georgia's counties are divided into Militia Districts based upon territory and population. In the early years, each district formed a militia unit for the protection of its citizens. They now primarily serve as election precincts.

In 1789 an act of the legislature created the Inferior County Court. This court served as a civil and, in some cases, a criminal court; a court of ordinary; and served as the board for the administration of county affairs. The Inferior Court was abolished in 1868 when a Court of Ordinary was established, and Boards of Commissioners were set up in each county. Many duties of the old Inferior Court were given to the Court of Ordinary while the Board of Commissioners became the administrator of county affairs.

The Georgia Constitution provided for the establishment of 5 primary courts--the Supreme, Appellate, Superior, Ordinary and Justice of the Peace. Numerous other courts of varying degrees of jurisdiction were also provided. The courts whose records are of the most importance to genealogists are the Superior and Ordinary Courts of each county.

The Clerk of Superior Court is elected for a term of 4 years. He not only can serve as Superior Court Clerk, but is also eligible to serve as clerk of the city court of his residence. In

actuality, the clerk is the records keeper of the Superior and City Courts. Every deed, bill of sale, all minutes and verdicts of civil and criminal cases are kept by the clerk.

The Court of Ordinary is presided over by the Ordinary, an elected official for a term of 4 years. This court is responsible for the probate of wills; granting or revoking letters of testament and administration; the sale of property and distribution of estates of deceased persons; the appointment and removal of guardians of minors or persons of unsound mind; traffic cases not requiring a jury trial; issuing permits to carry firearms; issuing marriage licenses and certificates of marriage. The Ordinary is responsible for recording wills filed for probate; bonds furnished by executors, administrators and guardians; recording appraisals and inventories, and sales of estates; and is responsible for all state and county elections.

Many counties in Georgia have excellent county records which include all or most of the records from the creation of the county. In some counties these records are indexed, making research an easier task. Some counties lost records due to inefficient clerks who recorded transactions on loose papers rather than in books. Other counties lost records when courthouses burned. Records were occasionally destroyed by natural disasters, such as floods and tornadoes. Many records have been lost due to overzealous family researchers who tore desired records from the original books.

Most of the Georgia County records have been microfilmed and are available to researchers at the Georgia Department of Archives and History located at 330 Capitol Avenue, S E, Atlanta, Georgia 30334 (adjacent to Interstate 20). A few Georgia counties did not allow their records to be microfilmed.

The following is a list of Georgia county courthouses which were destroyed by fires, floods, tornadoes and various other storms. This list was printed in Kenneth Thomas' column, "Genealogy" in the Atlanta Journal on Feb. 18, 1979, and Feb. 25, 1979; and is also available at the Georgia Archives.

QUARTERLY PROJECT: "BIBLE RECORDS"

Get out your "Sherlock Holmes" hat and begin searching for old Family Bibles. As our title indicates, this quarter's project is "Bible Records." We will accept any Bible records, but are primarily interested in Strickland and allied families. Those records not pertaining to our society will be placed in the Georgia Dept. of Archives & History, or in the Archives of the state where the family resided. Please check with relatives for any Bible records. Bible records are of utmost importance to the genealogist, and are the records most often lost or destroyed. We must help to preserve these records for present and future family genealogists.

The following steps are important in obtaining copies of family pages from a Bible:

1. Make a copy (zerox) of the Title page of the Bible which gives the date of publication.

2. Make a clear copy (zerox) of the pages containing handwritten family information. If the names & dates are not clear, do not attempt to trace over the writing to make it clearer. DO write or type this information on a separate sheet.

3. Check for any loose papers stored for safe keeping in the Bible. Newspaper obituaries, wedding invitations & other important genealogical information can often be found in old Bibles. Zerox these on a separate page, and write on the back the family surname and publishing date of the Bible.

4. It is not necessary, but always makes zerox copies of records more valuable if they are notarized.

Check with friends and relatives, and gather as many Bible records as possible to help us get our quarterly projects off to a good start. After all, we are a "research group"--and this includes YOU!

REPORT FROM BOOK/FILM COMMITTEE:

The Book/Film Committee was formed to compile a record or catalogue of books and films which contain STRICKLAND and allied family genealogical and/or historical information. We urge all members, when possible, photocopy such info. and send to the Strickland Library. Please note on the copy margin: author, book title, date published, and where you found the book. If unable to send a photocopy (it can get expensive), please note the above information, including applicable page numbers, and send a list of these references to me for cataloguing. We hope this catalogue will eventually contain all known printed sources of genealogical material on Strickland and allied families. This will be a valuable index for all members of the Strickland family.

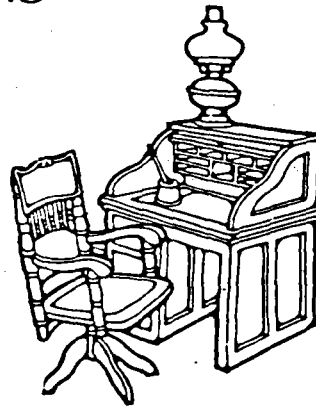
