LETTER FROM THE EDITOR:

Dear Members,

I am pleased to report we are off to a good start again this year. Many members have already sent in their dues; along with queries and donations to the Research Fund. I, for one, am very pleased to see such good response at the beginning of the year, and I am glad you are using the query sheet provided in the last issue.

Our February workshop was a total failure due to inclement weather. However, the attendance at the March workshop could not be blamed on the weather. Only three members came to the Georgia Archives for the March 7th workshop. Even though we were a small group, we covered a lot of records and accomplished quite a lot. I would especially like to thank Evelyn Marshall for the hours she spent in searching through the printed material pertaining to several states for references to Stricklands. Some of this information is being printed in this issue of Strickland Scene.

Our next workshop is planned for Tuesday, May 3rd. At this moment, it is undecided as to whether it will be at the Georgia Archives or the Atlanta Historical Soc. Please let me know if you plan to attend and I will send you a postcard as to the time and place of this workshop.

On March 19th, I represented Strickland Research, Inc. as guest speaker at the Liberty Hill Historical Society in Troup County, Georgia. Ann and Bill Petry invited my husband and I to the lovely old Strickland home in Liberty Hill for dinner. This home, built in 1858, is on a part of the original land owned by Wilson and Teresa (Pittman) Strickland. Four sons of Wilson built this house; and it became the home of Willis Washington Strickland and his wife, Susan Allen. It is a wooden frame house. The interior walls are of wide planking which was cut from timber on the land, and the bricks used in the two chimneys were made on the property. The house plan is similar to many built in this period, with a wide hallway from front door to back door and

two large rooms on each side of the hallway. Originally, there was a separate dining room, connected to the house by a "dog trot." Beyond the dining room, there was a kitchen. Ann and Bill are in the process of restoring the house, and have plans to rebuild the dining room.

Before dinner, we visited the Strickland Family Cemetery where Wilson and Teresa Strickland, and many of their family, are buried. This cemetery is well-kept and is protected by a chain link fence. The survey of this cemetery, included in this issue, was done by Ann's mother a number of years ago.

After dinner, we attended the Liberty Hill Historical Society meeting at the Liberty Hill Baptist Church. This beautiful old church has many of the features included in the Strickland home - wide planking in the walls and ceiling (the ceiling has now been covered by acoustical tile), and tall windows.

My husband and I were both grateful for an opportunity to visit this little community, and to meet the gracious people who live there. And, as always, I was glad to have the opportunity to tell others about the Strickland Family.

Last year, it was brought to our attention by Sharon Primeau (one of our members) that Randolph County, Arkansas, had decided to give the original marriage records of persons married in the county to any who could prove descent. We wrote to Randolph County and requested any Strickland marriage records which had not been claimed by a descendant. As a result, we now have four original marriage certificates from Arkansas. These marriages are being printed in this issue. Our thanks to Sharon for letting us know about this matter.

Remember to send us any updates in your lineage charts; and remember to send any current information on your immediate family for your membership file.

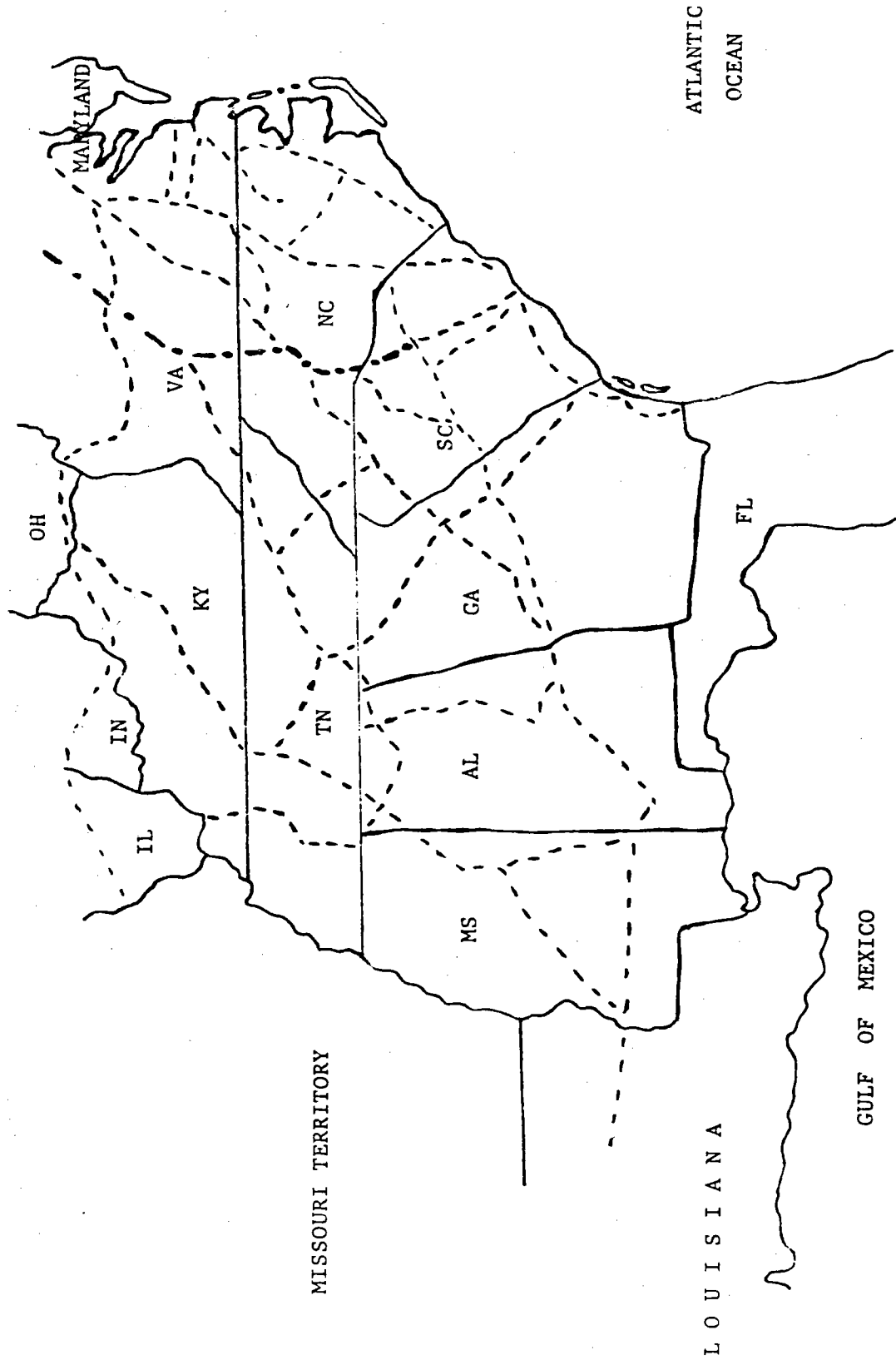

EARLY MIGRATION ROUTES

Many people traveled by water, using the coastline or rivers as routes of migration, but, as the map below indicates, the early Indian paths and the Great Philadelphia Wagon Road (shown by -.-.-) were probably the most widely used routes. The map below shows the approximate land routes of emigrants in the 1700's and early 1800's. There were other more northerly routes, but the map from which this information was taken did not show these routes.

In The Year Of 1937

The following information was contributed by Robert L. Strickland, 210 Glentower Drive, San Antonio, TX 78213. This research was done for Robert Strickland's father in 1937.

RICHARD: (Vet. Adm. Records) Enlisted and served from Nov. 21, 1814 to May 6, 1815 as a Priv. in Capt. Nehemiah Garrison's company of Ga. militia and was discharged at Fort Hawkins, Ga. He stated that this service was rendered as a substitute, but did not state the name of the person for whom he served. On Jan. 8, 1851 he applied for the bounty land which was due on account of his service in the War of 1812, at which time he resided in Madison Co, Ga., his post office, Danielsville. He was aged then about sixty-seven years; the date and place of his birth were not given. On the application, he was allowed 80 acres of bounty land on warrant #45348, under Act of 1850. He applied May 30, 1855 for additional bounty land under the Act of 1855. On this second application, he was allowed 80 A. of bounty land on warrant #25418. In 1855, the soldier resided in Tishomingo Co., Miss., his post office, Farmington.

He married LUCRETIA BRYANT. He sold the mills (known in recent times as Seagraves Mill on the Nowhere Rd., Madison Co.) Dec. 14, 1848: RICHARD STRICKLAND, SR. to WASHINGTON STRICKLAND. "All that tract of land situate lying and being in the county aforesaid and adjoining lands of VANDERFORD and others on the waters of Sandy Creek containing 373 A. more or less beginning at a red oak near the Mill dam and head of the race on the west side of the creek running N-48432 chains to a pine thence S7W9 to a post oak thence S50E31 chains to a black gum thence N70E39 chains to a chestnut thence S1W30 chains to a black gum at the head of the mill pond thence down to the water's edge at high water mark." Deed by WASHINGTON and ELIZ. STRICKLAND to ROBERT PITTMAN, Madison Co., Oct. 9, 1882.

He moved to old Tishomingo Co., Miss. to live with one younger son, BENJAMIN PERRYMAN. Both died within a year apart, some eight or nine years later, and were buried about nine miles from Corinth, Miss. It has been passed down through several generations of the family, and other old-timers that LUCRETIA was a cousin of our General GEORGE WASHINGTON.

In 1805, Nash Co., NC, RICHARD with some of the other children of HENRY S. (DANIEL TAYLOR and wife, LANEY or LONA; CORNELIUS or CARROLUS; HENRY; ZILPAH or ZELPHIA; WILSON WILLIAMS and CHERRY or CLARY S. WILLIAMS) deeded to NOAH STRICKLAND, lands decended to them from HENRY S. (father). On Apr. 15, 1799, Nash Co., NC, the division of lands of JOSEPH S. deceased, to his heirs, ZELPHENIA S. 130 A, HENRY S. 55 A, BENNETT S. land granted to HARMON S. in Nov. 1779, CLARY WILLIAMS 150 A, WRIGHT CARLEVUS (CARROLUS) 150 A, RICHARD S. 150 A, and LONA S. 150 A. The Vendue Bill, Jackson Co., Ga., of estate of HENRY STRICKLAND, sold Dec. 10, 1796 by MARY STRICKLAND (wife) and JACOB S. (son) Adm't'r's, Estate divided, one third part to MARY (wife) and one sixth part to JACOB, CHAS. (CARROLUS), HENRY, ZELPHIA, CLARY and RICHARD, the latter two minors and guardianship appointed Wed. Jan. 3, 1799, JACOB for RICHARD and MARY for CLARY. In Franklin Co., Ga.-- July 13, 1807, case of RICHARD STRICKLAND assigns vs. MOSES WILCOX. Settled at defendants cost.

Jackson Co., Ga. records. County formed 1796 from Franklin Co.  
In 1811 part of Jackson Co. and Franklin Co. became Madison Co.

CHILDREN OF RICHARD AND LUCRETIA STRICKLAND:

POLLY mar. JOHN (generally known as Jehugh--pronounced Ja-hugh) STREETMAN (cousin below), May 22, 1826 Madison Co., Ga. Mar. Records. Moved to Miss. where most of descendents now live with many scattered over Ark., Texas, Okla., northern and western states. CHILDREN: (Prof. Edw. STRICKLAND, Belmont, Miss. can assist in this).

WILSON. (It is believed by relatives and old-timers that he was one of the oldest children, and in his boy-hood accidentally killed a young negro slave in a sham rock battle, immediately left and was heard of by some members of family as being in Texas. It is generally known that WASHINGTON, NOAH and BENJ. PERRYMAN inserted notice in newspapers between 1880 and 1885, at which time WASHINGTON returned from Calif. to see brother NOAH. In NOAH's letter, dated Feb. 5, 1867, he wanted WASHINGTON to come to visit him in Calif. and offered to pay expenses of one son should he like to come. Mrs. E. O. PIKE, Atlanta, Ga., a descendant of ZELPHIA S. recalls WASHINGTON's return from the West when he stopped over with them in Nicholson, Ga. several days. She states she had the idea from the conversation with him that he failed to find what he went West for.)

FRANCIS (FRANKIE) mar. JOHN W. STREETMAN (cousin above), June 7, 1827, Madison Co., Ga. Mar. Records. Remained in Georgia, however, unable to locate descendants. NOAH S. letter Feb. 5, 1867, asked that she be informed that he was well, married and living very happy and wanted to hear from her.

CHILDREN:

ED (EDMUND or EDMOND), born 1823, moved to Miss., in 1840's. Executed by Federals (belief of family and see letter from NOAH S. Feb. 6, 1867 asking WASH. and ELIZ. for detailed info. on hanging). War Dept. Record: Priv. Company A, Davenport Battalion (State Troops), Miss. Cavalry, CSA. Enlisted July 1, 1863, at Itawanba. About Sept. 8, 1863, this Co. became Co. B, 6th Regt., Miss. Cav., CSA; and the muster roll of that company for Sept. 8, 1863 to \_\_\_\_\_, dated June 29, 1864, last on file, shows him "Absent without leave in co. independent Scouts". His age on this roll is shown as 40 yrs. Also see HISTORY OF OLD TISHOMINGO CO., MISS. Unable to find if he ever married.

RICHARD mar. ELIZABETH (BETTY or BETSY) McKEOWN (McCUNE), sister of LUCINDA "CINDY" McCUNE (McKEOWN), April 25, 1832, Madison Co., Ga. Mar. Records. Moved to Miss. in 1840's.

CHILDREN:

R. P. STRICKLAND. War Dept. Records: Priv. Co. F, 26th Regt. Miss. Inf. CSA, Enlisted Sept. 1, 1861, at Iuka, Miss.; age 18 yrs (also shown as 19 yrs), born in Miss., res. Corinth, Miss.; occupation, farmer; a single man. Captured at Fort Donelson, Feb. 1862, imprisoned at Camp Morton, Indianapolis, Ind.; and was rec'd. by the Confederate Agent near Vicksburg, Miss., Sept. 11, 1862, for exchange. The Co. muster roll for Oct. 31 to Dec. 31, 1862, shows "Deserted", Nov. 17, 1862. Also see HISTORY OF OLD TISHOMINGO CO., MISS.

Two unmarried daughters, and probably more.

LUCRETIA mar. ROBT. SMITH, Feb. 1, 1838, Madison Co., Ga. Mar. Records. (Bible in hands of descendants near Lawrenceville, Ga. shows CRESY born May 4, 1814, and ROBT. born Jan. 15, 1816.) NOAH S. letter, dated Feb. 5, 1867, asked that she be informed that he was well, married and living very happy and wanted to hear from them.
