NEWLY LOCATED 18TH CENTURY HENDERSON-STRICKLAND BIBLE RECORD
FROM UPPER FREEHOLD TOWNSHIP, MONMOUTH COUNTY, NEW JERSEY

Shown is the title page torn from the 1730 bible of ANN STRICKLIN HENDERSON, of Upper Freehold Township, Monmouth County, New Jersey, widow of SAMUEL HENDERSON, that was submitted with a deposition she made November 10, 1838 before THOMAS C. THROCKMORTON, a judge of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Monmouth and State of New Jersey, in support of her application for a widow's pension.

ANN STRICKLIN (as her maiden name appeared in the deposition) and SAMUEL HENDERSON were married May 1780 by Rev. JOHN WOODHULL, D.D., with her bridesmaid EFFIE WILSON and JONATHAN CLAYTON his groomsman. The minister and two attendants were deceased at the time of her deposition.

ANN stated that the bible had once belonged to her mother. It would appear that at least the earliest entry, for AMEY STRICKLAND, Junr., was probably made at that time. Distinctly different scripts were used for each of the first two entries, which in part accounts for the variation in surname spelling. She further stated that the entry for THOMAS HENDERSON, their eldest child, was written by her husband SAMUEL shortly after THOMAS's birth. As ANN signed her name with an "X", and the script is similar for all the children's entries, it is likely all were made by SAMUEL.

ANN reported to have had nine children by her husband SAMUEL, of whom seven were then living in 1838 "as she hopes and believes", indicating it likely that not all were nearby. Only eight children were listed in the bible record shown, the last a month before ANN's fortieth birthday.

In a 1933 response in the file to an inquiry by ELIZABETH HENDERSON, 57 DeVee Street, South River, New Jersey, the government respondent recites from other sources that: 1. JONATHAN STRICKLIN, the brother of ANN, was living at the time of her marriage to SAMUEL HENDERSON; 2. One JOHN HENDERSON who was a resident of Leeds Point, New Jersey, in 1846, was no relationship to this family; 3. In 1838 SAMUEL's son-in-law, JOHN A. CLAYTON, aged about 57 years, stated that he married a daughter of SAMUEL and ANN (which one not identified) in February 1816 (or 1815 - carbon copy is unclear), that he resided then in Upper Freehold Township, and that ANN HENDERSON, SAMUEL's widow, had resided principally in his family for twenty years; and, 4. THOMAS HENDERSON, son of SAMUEL and ANN, died aged about 21 years.

ANN's deposition stated that SAMUEL entered service in New Jersey during July 1776 as a private in the militia, at and from which time he resided in Freehold Township until his death March 4, 1809. He served on alternate monthly tours during each succeeding year through 1781, under Captains HENDRICK SMOCK, BENJAMIN VAN CLEAF, WILLIAM VAN CLEAF and Colonel ASHER HOLMES in the New Jersey troops. After HENDRICK SMOCK retired and left command of the company, JONATHAN CLAYTON (presumably the same as was groomsman at SAMUEL's and ANN's wedding, and likely the father of their son-in-law JOHN A. CLAYTON) was appointed ensign, DAVID FORMAN was general in command, and ELISHA WALTON was major. SAMUEL's duties were to "guard the coasts and shores from the British and refugees". He was not known ever to have been engaged in battle.

At the time of his death SAMUEL was "seized and possessed of a small real estate in Freehold Township", which ANN in 1838 possessed in anticipation it would pass to her children. She had remained a widow, and was age 83 at the time of her deposition. Her claim for a pension was not allowed as she failed to furnish proof of service as required by the pension law under which she applied.

The bible record and ANN's deposition are located under SAMUEL HENDERSON's name in alphabetical order among the National Archives microfilm series, "Selected Records From Revolutionary War Pension Files". This material was located quite by accident while searching for data on another SAMUEL HENDERSON of the same period, a resident of then West Tennessee (in or near Rutherford County), whose daughter MARY HENDERSON married a JOHN STRICKLAND.

DESCRIPTIONS AND EXPLANATIONS OF PAGES 69 - 72:

Editor's Note: Please forgive me for omitting the page numbers for 69 through 72. I was enrolled in a printing class (for fun) and we were required to bring our own projects to the class. One of my projects was learning to photograph documents and prepare them for printing. After cleaning the negatives, I made a metal plate from which these pages were printed. It isn't the best job in the world, but I enjoyed doing it. The will of Zadock Strickland was quite interesting because the copy we have in our files is difficult to read. It took quite a lot of time to clean up the negative so the finished product would be legible. I hope you enjoy these. -NJC.

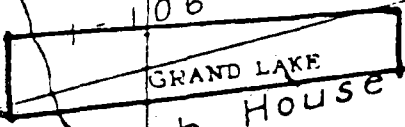
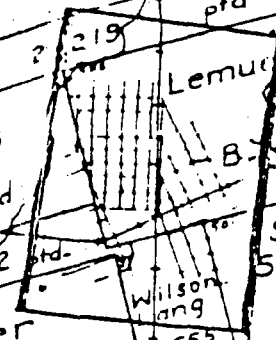
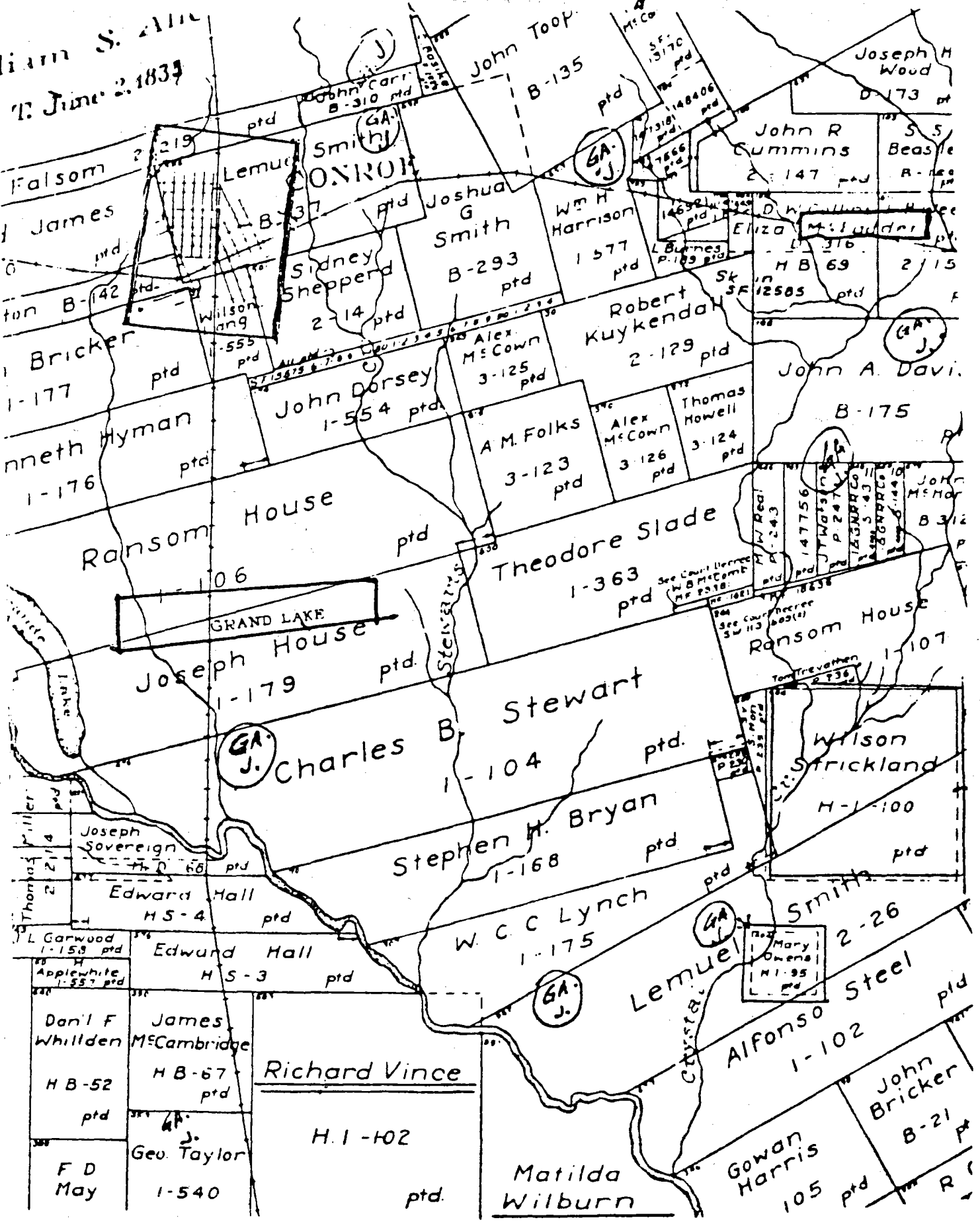

In the Name of God, Amen

I Zadock Stricklands of the County of Nash and State of North Carolina being of sound and disposing mind and memory but considering the uncertainty of mortal life do make and declare this my last will and Testament in manner and form viz)

1st I leave to my wife Rebecca Stricklands all of the tract of lands whereon I now live during her natural life or widowhood, which shall not be otherwise taken after disposed of with one Horse, two Milch Cows and Calves, two sows and piggs, two feather Beds and furniture, One side boards, two Tables, six sitting chairs, One small Wagon, One Oxen and Cart together all necessary farming tools and cooking utensils

2nd At the death or marriage of my said wife Rebecca Stricklands the above named tract of land shall descend in like manner to my daughter in law Army Stricklands, and at her death or marriage I give and bequeath the said tract of land to my three Grand children viz Joseph A. Susan A. R. and Leonard Stricklands, to be equally divided among them share and share alike but the other articles of property loaned to my wife shall be sold by my Executor ^{after her death} and the proceeds thereof disposed of in like manner with the balance of my Estate not otherwise disposed of

3rd I give to my son Allison Stricklands one hundred Acres of land to be cut off from the South West Corner of the tract whereon I now live, on the Bidston branch adjoining the lands of Lion Sanders and J. N. W. Strickland to him and his heirs forever

4th I give to my son Maddison Strickland twenty dollars as his portion in my Estate to him and his heirs forever

ON THE HORIZON: INEXPENSIVE 100,000 VOLUME GENEALOGICAL LIBRARIES

ON COMPACT DISKS FOR HOME USE!

The first quarter 1986 issue of Genealogical Computing describes some new developments in information storage technology that hold exciting prospects for genealogical researchers in the not so distant future. These technologies are coming available now, and their application to genealogical research is just a matter of time. The following items were noted by GC, among much more:

A 3M Optical Recording Project brochure about their "3M Erasable Optical Disk" stated: One such 3M disk can store 300-500 megabytes of data (equivalent to what can be stored on 700+ floppy disks) on a single side of their new disk; information can be changed or updated as easily as it can with a floppy disk; the low-power laser beam that reads the disk is all that touches the disk, virtually eliminating wear of the disk, so there is little risk of data loss from abrasion.

A brochure on the Philips Compact Disk ROM ("read only memory" - i.e., accessible to "read" data from, but not to "write" data on) states that their compact disk stores up to 600 megabytes of data, representing over 200,000 pages of text, or more than 1,000 images (such as screen size copies of maps, wills, photographs, or any other original documents), or hours of spoken text, or any combination of these!

A Digital Equipment Corporation brochure about CD ROM (Compact Disk Read Only Memory) cited in the same GC issue says about the same: 600 megabytes storage, equal to 200,000 single-spaced typewritten pages of text, 1,200 microfiche cards, 1,600 floppy disks, or 46 days of data transmission at 1,200 baud (i.e., bits per second, a measurement of data transmission speed).

GC notes from an October 1984 article in Electro-Optics Magazine that at that time over 50 firms worldwide had taken licenses to build compact disk players from the co-developers, N.V. Philips and Sony. These are the same disks that are rapidly overtaking "old fashioned" phonograph records for high fidelity music reproduction, but their use is not only for storing digitized music. With proper indexing, any word of the 100,000,000 on a \$2.70 compact disk can be located in a few seconds!

According to GC, the Technics Division of Matsushita Electric announced for December 1985 delivery the SL-P15, a \$1,500.00 multi compact disk player. Each "magazine" (disk holder) will hold 51 disks. This would give you access to 13.5 million pages of material, or some 45,000 volumes at 300 pages per volume, with access time under 20 seconds to any track on any disk, in a machine 16" x 16" x 8" - about the size of a bread box!

Along with the editor of Genealogical Computing, Paul Andereck, at the 1985 Optical Disc Read Only Memory Forum in Arlington, Virginia, was Ken Suzuki, a Latter Day Saints Genealogy Department representative, inspiring Mr. Andereck to ponder, "If one CD ROM disc can hold the data that a stack 12 1/2 feet high of IBM-PC diskettes can hold, I wonder how many Mormon microfilm rolls will fit on one?"
